Peer review and its importance in evaluation for Pharmaceutical and Medical Journals

Peer review, which is the evaluation of work by one or more persons who have similar qualifications to the producers of work on which our beloved journal (UJPR) has relied from the first day of its inception. This method works as a form of self-regulation by members who are qualified for a profession in the relevant field and our journal has selected senior professors and Doctors in the various branches of medical and pharmaceutical sciences. The professional peer review of our journal has focused on the performance of professionals, with the aim of improving the quality of our journal, and adhering to standards, to obtain evaluation certificates for our journal from specialized bodies and circles such as Scopus.

I recommend to my colleagues, students, and researchers from all corners of the globe to publish in the UJPR esteemed journal, which adopts a professional peer review process, which will determine when the article submitted has met the required medical standards and assure them of a professional and scientific response in a timely manner.

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
